I would also like to acknowledge, our department has had a challenging month as we lost an officer from our agency. Officer Bianca Quintana had been with APD for two years and worked out of the Foothills Area Command. Bianca was a mother to two boys, a wife, daughter, and sister and we are doing everything we can to support her family during this time.

Bianca's funeral services have been set for September 9, at 10:30a.m. at Legacy Church, located at 7201 Central Avenue N.W. The family welcomes the community to honor her, during a celebration of life.

As for our crime fighting efforts, we continue to have an increased presence of officers downtown on Friday and Saturday nights. We know this area is of concern and we have made it a priority.

We recently announced robberies are down 50% since 2018 and this goes to show the progress we are making as a department in terms of tackling crime.

We have a robust DIVRT team made up of mostly civilian staff members focused on retrieving video surveillance footage and other digital evidence that assists sworn personnel in their investigations.

By having this civilian team, it frees up time for officers and detectives to focus on their caseloads. Crime Stoppers, APD's detective academy, and internal information sharing amongst divisions have had the strongest impact in identifying and charging repeat or violent offenders, such as those committing robberies.

And to kick off the month, we have an exciting community event coming up. This will be a largescale Coffee with a Cop event partnering with the Dunkin' Community Cruiser. The event will be held on September 10, at the University Substation from 8-11:00a.m., and there will be FREE coffee and donuts.



Help me clean up graffiti in our community and download the "ABQ 311" App. It's easy, if you see graffiti in our community stop in a safe area and take a photo. Pin your location and give a brief description of what and where the graffiti is located so our city employees can easily respond for clean-up.

Albuquerque Metro Crime Stoppers is a community program that relies on anonymous tips to solve crimes and to locate fugitives from justice. Without anonymity of callers, the program cannot be effective.

Crime Stoppers pays rewards only for anonymous tips. Tipsters who identify themselves are not eligible for a reward.

Crime Stoppers has sole discretion to decide the amount of any reward to be paid, from zero to \$1,000.

Crime Stoppers will pay rewards only for tips given directly to it. Any tip given to another source, such as law enforcement, will not be eligible for a Crime Stoppers reward.

Crime Stoppers does not pay rewards to any person who has a legal duty to assist in the arrest of suspects and fugitives.

Felony Gun Crime + Arrest = Up to a \$1,000 CASH REWARD

Child Safety

Teach children to be safe at home and while out. "Stranger Danger" can be a difficult concept to grasp as children encounter strangers daily; a better approach is to teach children about good "friends" or "helpers" who assist during emergencies such as: *Teachers, Police Officers, Firefighters, Doctors and Paramedics.*

General Safety Tips Safety at Home Children should know their full name, ad-Post rules where children can see them. dress and phone number. Choose babysitters carefully. Check references Teach children that adults should not ask and listen to feedback from the children. children for help, adults ask other adults Teach children how to lock the door and never let anyone in or let anyone know they are for help. Do not drop off children at shopping malls, home alone. movie theaters or parks for unsupervised Instruct your children to check in with a trusted time. neighbor or call you as soon as they get home. Never leave children unattended in vehicles. Make sure they know how to call 911 in case of an Tell children it is ok to say "NO" to someemergency and post other important numbers. one they don't know or someone who is Establish rules about having friends over or going somewhere without your permission. making them feel uncomfortable. Set and enforce limits and boundaries. Tell children which neighbors they may visit. Foster good communication. Teach and reinforce the "buddy system." Know their friends and friends' parents.
