This has created a safe anonymous outlet for our students, school faculty and parents to report any suspicious or criminal activity. It's as simple as a text of "ABQCS" to 738477. The stickers to the right are ahaned out in most APS schools and the QR code takes you to more ways to report.






APD and the One Albuquerque Fund recently hosted a 300+ person conference. It was an honor to be the first U.S. city to host the annual Safety of Our Cities Conference which first originated in Canada. Police Chief's from across the U.S. and Canada as well as professionals from the tech industry and alternative response entities like the Albuquerque Community Safety Department, came together for an innovative 3-day conference. The panel discussions and presentations all focused on how all three industries can work together to make our communities

safer.

As we've shared this year we are down in all major crime categories, we have also seen a significant decrease over the last three years in homicides. This year, homicide detectives have

solved 40 of 48 cases, in addition to 22 cases from previous years, bringing the homicide clearance rate to 129%.

As we can only imagine what families in our community impacted by these crimes have experienced, we hope that this sends a clear message that if you attempt to commit a crime in our community, especially of this magnitude, there is a very high likely you will be caught.





And a big congratulations to Cadet Class 132! 13 new officers just graduated and are currently on On The Job Training before they are assigned their official area commands.

APD now hold four academies a year which allows for officers to be out on our streets working quicker from the previous format of only two academies a year.

With both the pre-hire program and the L.E.A.P. program, we are making it easier for qualified candidates to get hired. Anyone interested in applying can do so at <u>apply.apdonline.com</u>.



ABQ 311

Help me clean up graffiti in our community and download the "ABQ 311" App. It's easy, if you see graffiti in our community stop in a safe area and take a photo. Pin your location and give a brief description of what and where the graffiti is located so our city employees can easily respond for clean-up.

Albuquerque Metro Crime Stoppers is a community program that relies on anonymous tips to solve crimes and to locate fugitives from justice. Without anonymity of callers, the program cannot be effective.

Crime Stoppers pays rewards only for anonymous tips. Tipsters who identify themselves are not eligible for a reward.

Crime Stoppers has sole discretion to decide the amount of any reward to be paid, from zero to \$1,000.

Crime Stoppers will pay rewards only for tips given directly to it. Any tip given to another source, such as law enforcement, will not be eligible for a Crime Stoppers reward.

Crime Stoppers does not pay rewards to any person who has a legal duty to assist in the arrest of suspects and fugitives.

Felony Gun Crime + Arrest = Up to a \$1,000 CASH REWARD

Community Policing Councils

We say the CPC is about Communication, Collaboration, and Cooperation to promote Consensus building, between neighborhoods, and the Albuquerque Policing Council.

We also say that "CPC" stands for "Common People Can."

At the September Southwest Community Policing Council earlier this month at the Central and Unser library, a veteran well into his 60s, and a retiree from the City stood up and told us he had a great story to tell APD. The Council and I were all interested to hear the story, but told the gentleman he could present it toward the end of the meeting.

This was an important CPC as twice a year, Chief Harold Medina hits Area Command CPC to deliver what he calls "The State of the Department.

The Chief's address was well received by the 15 or so people in the room and the 10 more online, and afterward SW Area Commander Rene Barraza went over the Area Command stats for the month of August. This was also a positive report as crime numbers are down all over the city. We then had an area discussion about things going on in SW Albuquerque and the gentleman got his chance to speak.

"I'm a Navy Veteran, and a retiree of the City's security force," he said, "and I have had a huge problem going on for some years now." "My neighbors all day long, play this loud music from their home and their cars, all day and all night! I'm retired, I just want to relax and I can't in my house." "I'm pretty sure," he continued that they are doing some illegal things there as well."

The Community Policing Councils are a City-run fully-volunteer program within the City limits with the goal of taking Albuquerque-resident input to help the City build the nation's best police force. The CPCs were originally recognized by Mayor Richard Berry in 2013 as part of the process of increasing public relations between APD and the residents it serves. We were made official in the year 2020 by the Albuquerque City Council and currently run 7 meetings monthly around the City.

Commander Barraza and the Council spoke to the man about his issues and his list of complaints; the emergency operator system, the importance of the legislature in passing pro law-enforcement legislation, the difficulty in Albuquerque of incarcerating misdemeanor offenders, and other issues that contributed to this gentleman's frustration. The Commander went deep into his past as a patrolman and spoke about the laws governing excessive noise, intimidation, and other things, and he was invited to send a reminder email. He also indicated that he does not use email. He left that day with a phone number to the Substation, and a promise from Commander Barraza to have a patrol check on his block from time to time.

In my 5 years as CPC Liaison for the City, I have found this one-on-one interaction, and the ability to let your local police department know what is happening, is the most effective feature of the Community Policing Council. The Council does offer law-enforcement related education opportunities, the opportunity to submit recommendations that must receive a response from the Chief within 45-days, and monthly meetings with excellent and pertinent speakers from city, county, state and US government, the court system, the Bernalillo Metro Detention Center, legislators and representatives of local non-profits attempting to help improve the city, but the direct interaction with APD command staff is the cherry on top of the sundae.

We are currently looking for SE Councilmembers who have about 5 hours monthly to attend meetings, keep up on what is happening, have good ideas, and want to help their community. That's about it for requirements, and, oh, would like to meet good neighbors who are similarly-focused in making a difference.
