

CRIME PREVENTION TIPS

Unfortunately, no neighborhood is completely immune to crime. However, there are steps you can take to help keep your family and your neighborhood safe.

·Know where your children are. Have your children tell you or ask permission before leaving the house and give them a time to check in or be home. When possible, have them leave a phone number of where they will be. Help children learn important phone numbers. Have your children practice reciting their home phone number and address, and your work and cell phone numbers. If they have trouble memorizing these, write them down on a card and have them carry it at all times. Tell your children where you will be and the best way to reach you. Set limits on where your children can go in your neighborhood. Do you want them crossing busy roads? Playing in alleys or abandoned buildings? Are there certain homes in your neighborhood that you don't want your children to go to? . Get to know your children's friends. Meet their parents before letting your children to go to their home and keep a list of their phone numbers. If you can't meet their parents, call and talk to them. Ask what your children might do at their house and if they will be supervised. Choose a safe house in your neighborhood. Pick a neighbor's house where your children can go if they need help. Point out other places they can go for help, like stores, libraries, and police stations. •Teach children to settle arguments with words, not fists. Role-play talking out problems, walking away from fist fights, and what to do when confronted with bullies. Remind them that taunting and teasing can hurt friends and make enemies. Work together with your neighbors. Watch out for suspicious and unusual behavior in your neighborhood. Get to know your neighbors and their children so you can look out for one another.

PROPERTY CRIME ACTIVITY FOR JULY 2023 Definitions

Burglary – Unauthorized entry of any vehicle, watercraft, aircraft, dwelling or other structure, moveable or immovable, with the intent to commit a felony or theft therein.

Robbery – Consists of the theft of anything of value from the person of another or from the immediate control of another, by use or threatened use of force or violence.

Motor Vehicle Theft – Consists of a person taking any vehicle or motor vehicle intentionally and without consent of the owner.

The Albuquerque Police Department Southwest Area Command uses the computer Aided Dispatch (CAD) data to determine crime trends in the area. When a response is indicated, the information received from the caller will be entered into the CAD for a response. The information from the caller allows ECC staff to determine the priority of the call, how many officers to dispatch, and it provides the officers with vital information so they can determine what action to take as they respond to a call for service.

Residential Burglaries

It is always good practice to make it look like someone is home at all times. Turn a radio on to a talk show station when you are gone, this will make it appear that someone is inside of your home.

Carjacking

Always be aware

of your surroundings. Pay special attention when you are at a standstill such as when you are at a stop light or in a parking lot. Keep doors locked, roll up your windows and notice who is in the immediate area.

Robbery to an Individual

Use situational awareness, look around, walk with confidence, make eye contact and read peoples body language. If you do find yourself in this situation, give them whatever possession they are demanding, remember, possessions can always be replaced – you, cannot.





I want to thank you on behalf of myself and Pat Hurley neighbors for the excellent job SW Area Command did in handling the chaotic situation on the 4th of July at Pat Hurley Park that has grown in size with every passing year.

Over the years residents here have tried to work with APD and various city officials and agencies to help us combat the growing crime and violence in this area. Gun fire here is an every night occurrence. My own house has been hit twice with bullets. Pat Hurley Park on the 4th of July with no oversight was a disaster waiting to happen as we all have now seen the news of shootings in crowds that happened across the nation on the 4th. Commander, you had the professional foresight and immediate grasp of the situation to develop a plan and implement it on short notice with incredible timing and efficiency.

By 8:30-9:00 p.m. on the 4th, cars were packing onto La Bajada Rd., Yucca, and surrounding areas, the park chaotic with an overload of people. Officer Clay Blalock was the first officer I had contact with, and I want to commend him for his nononsense skill and ability to communicate and assure us that the situation was going to brought under control and immediately got to work. I also want to commend Sergeant Lujan and Lt. Costales with the PR Team. This was a full-on, well executed, precision police operation that showed incredible coordination. In my 25 years of living here, I have never seen anything like it.

APD closed the park at 10:00 p.m. and still weren't done. Officers came back at 11:00 p.m. to handle the people that had snuck back in. I also want to thank the AFD for working in conjunction with APD to ensure the safety of everyone. It makes me believe again what Albuquerque could be without all the crime.

Moving forward, I hope that plans continue to be developed to enhance the safety and security of this area. Commander Barraza, thank you.
