# Indicator: Second Grade Students Reading at or above Grade Level

Progress Rating: Local Trend: POSITIVE National Comparison: NOT KNOWN

## **Indicator Description**

Students at the end of second grade in all Albuquerque Public Schools are assessed for reading grade level. This information is reported by the number and percent of students reading at or above second grade level.

## Why is this indicator important?

Students learn to read in pre-school and the early grades. After third grade, students must use reading to learn other subjects, making reading an essential skill for successful continued education. Research on early learning shows that children learn at very different rates. The earlier reading problems are remedied, the greater is the likelihood of success for the student. Dropout rates have been correlated with early reading failure. Higher dropout rates in turn contribute to unemployment and lower average income.

Identifying students who are at risk of not learning to read during the "window of opportunity" helps direct resources and attention toward these students and make specialized interventions available. Providing prevention in the form of specialized reading programs is more effective and less costly than providing intervention later after students have dropped out of school. Further, identifying students with early learning difficulties allows other community-based programs to re-direct their resources and attention to those students.

#### What can we tell from the data?

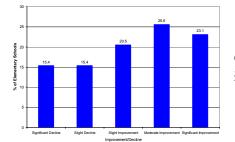
- District wide there was a 10.4% increase in the number of second graders reading at grade level from the 1998-1999 to 2002-2003 school years.
- More schools showed improvements in their respective rates of students reading at grade level.
- Elementary schools in the Cibola and West Mesa High School Clusters made significant progress in the past few years with increases of 41.8% and 41.3%, respectively.
