

Goal 2: Public Safety

Desired Community Condition: The community is prepared to respond to emergencies, natural disasters, catastrophic acts and other events that threaten the health and safety of the public.



Indicator: Area Emergency Operations Plan

Progress Rating: Local Trend: POSITIVE National Comparison: NOT APPLICABLE

Indicator Description

Albuquerque's Emergency Operations Plan will outline the coordination between the City and surrounding jurisdictions. The plan is currently under revision. After the terrorist attacks on September 11th, 2001, it became apparent that the City needed to update its Emergency Operations Plan. The City is also drafting a Pre Disaster Mitigation Plan which discusses conditions with the highest potential to cause an emergency and how to mitigate the condition. An example would be to look for a chemical plant in a residential neighborhood. The plan must be approved by May 2005. There area three subcommittees responsible to create the ten annexes of the Emergency Operations Plan.

Why is this indicator important?

The City and surrounding jurisdictions need to be prepared for numerous types of emergencies to protect the residents of Albuquerque. The emergency could arise from a chemical spill on the roadway infrastructure, an explosion at a public or private facility, or a terrorist attack. In either case, being prepared to handle the situation would be instrumental in a successful outcome. The State of New Mexico requires that we have an Emergency Operations Plan.

What can we tell from the data?

- The City has created the Office of Emergency Management (OEM), hired staff, and contracted with a
 consultant to draft an Emergency Operations Plan and a Pre Disaster Mitigation Plan. The Emergency
 Operations Plan encompasses response to all hazards in coordination with Bernalillo County, Village of Los
 Ranchos de Albuquerque, and the Village of Tijeras.
- The Pre Disaster Mitigation Plan is required by the Federal government to comply with grants the city has received.
- The Pre Disaster Mitigation Plan is nearly drafted. After approval by the City Council, the Office of Emergency
 Management will submit the plan to Bernalillo County, Village of Los Ranchos de Albuquerque, and the Village
 of Tijeras for their approval.

Organization of the Emergency Operations Plan

The Emergency Operations Plan is organized into ten categories or annexes. There are three subcommittees working on the plan who report to the Emergency Manager. The subcommittees and annexes are organized as follows:

A draft of the Emergency Operations Plan (EOP) is currently under review and is anticipated to be presented to City Council for review and concurrence in August or September, 2004. The EOP is scheduled to be adopted by City Council and signed by the Mayor in October, 2004.

The Pre Disaster Mitigation Plan will be completed, in draft by November 2004. As soon as the draft is complete, the Emergency Management Division will start coordinating approval to surrounding governmental entities: Bernalillo County, Village of Los Ranchos de Albuquerque, and the Village of Tijeras. The plan must be approved by May 2005.
