

METHODOLOGY

This research study was commissioned by the City of Albuquerque in order to assess citizens' perceptions of the overall quality of life in Albuquerque, satisfaction with City services, and opinions regarding priorities for the future.

The Interview

A random sample of 416 adult residents residing within Albuquerque City limits were interviewed by telephone. All interviews were conducted between April 11 and April 16, 2014.

Given the prevalence of cell phone users, 25% of the interviews were completed by random digit dialing cell phone number prefixes that have been issued in Albuquerque.

The telephone interviewers are professionals who are brought together for a training session prior to each survey. This ensures their complete and consistent understanding of the survey instrument. A total of 416 adult Albuquerque residents completed interviews.

Margin of Error

A sample size of 416 at a 95% confidence level provides a maximum margin of error of approximately 4.8%. In theory, in 95 out of 100 cases, the results based on a sample of 416 will differ by no more than 4.8 percentage points in either direction from what would have been obtained by interviewing all adult residents within the City of Albuquerque.

Sample Bias

In any survey, there are some respondents who will refuse to speak to the professional interviewer. A lower response rate among certain types of individuals can result in a sample wherein certain types of individuals are over-represented or under-represented. The potential for sampling bias increases as the response rate decreases. Research & Polling, Inc. often sets quotas for various segments of the population who are historically undercounted. This has the effect of minimizing, but not necessarily eliminating, sampling bias.

The Report

This report summarizes the results from each question in the survey and reports on any variances in attitude or perception, where significant, among demographic subgroups. The report also tracks results to past studies where possible.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

QUALITY OF LIFE

Like many areas in the nation and state, the City of Albuquerque has struggled over the last three years to regain its economic footing and has faced other adversity. Despite these challenges, the large majority of Albuquerque residents express satisfaction with the overall quality of life offered in the City. Approximately two-thirds of City residents characterize the overall quality of life here as being either *good* (58%) or *excellent* (10%), while 24% feel the overall quality of life in Albuquerque is *fair*, and few (8%) rate it poorly.

In other indicators of quality of life, nearly three-in-four residents say they would recommend Albuquerque to others as a place to live and 85% say they are likely to be living in the City five years from now.

In any city, feelings of personal safety and security are paramount to overall quality of life. On this front, the vast majority of Albuquerque residents say they feel either *very safe* (75%) or *somewhat safe* (19%) being alone outside in their neighborhood **during the day** and over three-quarters say they feel either *very safe* (45%) or *somewhat safe* (37%) being alone outside in their neighborhood **during the evening**. The percentage of residents who say they feel *very safe* alone in their neighborhood at night has actually improved compared to three years ago.

Although residents generally feel safe in the neighborhoods, there are concerns about safety in the Downtown area. Just 11% of City residents say they feel *very safe* Downtown, though 34% feel at least *somewhat safe*. More than one-in-four residents say they do not feel safe Downtown. Overall, residents are less inclined to feel safe Downtown than they were three years ago.

A vibrant Downtown can be a boon in terms of economic development and enhancing the overall vitality of a city. In order to create this type of atmosphere in Albuquerque, continued efforts need to be made to improve the image and overall experience of visiting the Downtown area.

It should also be noted that while the majority of residents at least partially agree that the City has adequate recreational opportunities for families, individuals, and community groups (63%) and that it has adequate amenities such as performing arts facilities and sports complexes (62%), less than one-third *strongly agree*. There is some indication that residents do want more in terms of cultural programs, performing arts, sports and other recreational amenities. In fact, the majority of residents (58%) say they would be at least somewhat willing to pay up to \$100 a year or more in taxes or fees in order to expand or improve cultural, performing arts, sports and recreation amenities in the City.

PUBLIC SERVICES

One of the real bright spots in terms of City services is the Albuquerque Fire Department. Residents' overall opinion of AFD has improved in the last three years in terms of responsiveness and addressing public safety. Overall, 85% of residents feel AFD is doing a good job responding to emergency medical/fire services and addressing public safety. The percentage of residents who *strongly agree* AFD is doing a good job addressing public safety and responding quickly to fires has increased from 41% in 2011 to 54% currently.

The Albuquerque Police Department on the other hand has faced a great deal of public scrutiny in the past three years, particularly in the months leading up to and during the time this survey took place. Not surprisingly, public sentiment towards the Police Department has been in a state of decline. While two-fifths of City residents feel APD is respectful of its citizens, 36% disagree (in comparison, 23% disagreed in 2011).

Furthermore, though the plurality (42%) of residents feel APD is doing a good job addressing public safety and making quick responses, 30% disagree. The percentage of residents who feel APD is doing a good job addressing public safety issues/making quick responses has fallen 14 percentage points since 2011.

Despite the well-publicized issues facing APD, there is other good news in the survey results in that residents are now more apt to agree that City government is generally responsive to community needs than they were in 2011 (36% and 30%, respectively). However, there is still a sizeable percentage of residents (23%) who disagree that City government is responsive. This is the area that most municipal governments struggle with and while it is a constant work in progress, it does appear that the City is making positive strides.


PRIORITIES FOR THE CITY

When planning future budgets, improving community services such as programs for homeless individuals and families, substance abuse, and mental health issues along with improving public safety services are rated as being the two highest priorities followed by partnering with business and local colleges in economic development programs and improving roads and streets. The majority of residents also believe that improving public

transportation services including Rapid Ride bus transit and improving parks and recreation programs should be a high priority.

When asked which of the above mentioned programs and services should be the *single* highest priority for the City, residents are more than two times as likely to choose improving community services (48%) over improving public safety (18%). This shows the importance that residents place on community services as a quality of life measure.


The fact that residents are more apt to place a priority on community services over public safety should not diminish the fact that the feeling of personal safety is an extremely important component to overall quality of life. This is exemplified by the fact that 72% of residents who rate the quality of life in Albuquerque as being *excellent* say they feel *very safe* being alone in their neighborhood at night. In comparison, just 21% of those who rate the quality of life in Albuquerque poorly say they feel *very safe* when alone at night.



Residents were asked if they believe Albuquerque has become a better place to live, is about the same, or has become a worse place to live in the past three years. Overall, nearly one-fifth (18%) believe that Albuquerque has become a better place to live, while the majority (57%) of residents believe that the City of Albuquerque is about the same. Just under one-quarter (24%) say that Albuquerque has become a worse place to live over the last three years.

Residents who are most apt to say that Albuquerque has become a *worse place* to live include residents with household incomes of \$20,000 or less (42%) compared to those with household incomes greater than \$20,000 (20%) and residents with a child under the age of eighteen in the household (30%) compared to those with no children under age eighteen (21%). Residents more likely to say Albuquerque has become a *better place* to live include Hispanics (21%) compared to Anglos (14%).

Since the 2011 study, there has been no change in the percentage of residents who say that Albuquerque is a *better place* to live. However, residents are slightly more likely to say Albuquerque has become a *worse place* to live than they were in 2011 (24% in 2014 compared to 19% in 2011).




City residents were asked to rate their **overall quality of life in Albuquerque**. As shown above, 10% of City residents rate the quality of life in Albuquerque as being *excellent* while the majority (58%) rate the quality of life as *good*, though 24% give a *fair* rating. Less than one-in-ten residents feel the quality of life in Albuquerque is either *poor* (6%) or *very poor* (2%).

Seniors are much more likely than residents under the age of 35 to rate the quality of life in Albuquerque highly (80% and 61%, respectively). It is also observed that residents with at least a four year college degree are more likely than those with a high school education or less to rate the quality of life positively (78% and 58%, respectively). Furthermore, as household income levels increase, so too does satisfaction with quality of life in the City.

Tracking Results

Overall, there is little change in residents' perceptions of quality of life when comparing the 2014 study to past results. The 68% who currently rate the overall quality of life as being either *good* or *excellent* is almost identical to the 67% observed in 2007 and the 65% observed on 2011.

Residents were asked how likely they are to recommend Albuquerque as a place to live and why they feel this way.

Nearly two-fifths (38%) of City residents say they are *very likely* to recommend Albuquerque as a place to live, while over one-third (35%) say they are *somewhat likely* to do so. One-in-ten residents say they are *neither likely nor unlikely*, while 17% are either *somewhat* (10%) or *very unlikely* (7%) to recommend Albuquerque as a place to live.


Residents more apt to say they would be *very likely* to recommend Albuquerque as a place to live include residents fifty and older (44%) compared to residents ages 18 to 34 (32%), and residents with no children under age eighteen in the household (43%) compared to those with children under age eighteen in the household (31%).


When comparing the 2014 study to past results, there is little variation in the percentages of residents who would be likely or unlikely to recommend Albuquerque as a place to live.


When residents were asked why they would not recommend Albuquerque as a place to live, the most frequently mentioned positive responses included: the climate/weather is pleasant (30%), friendly people (11%), good place to live (9%), scenic mountain setting (7%), and cultural diversity (6%).

The most frequently mentioned negative responses include: concerned about police department (12%), crime rate is high (11%), educational system is poor (6%), jobs are unavailable/few (5%) and lack of economic development (5%), and government /political leadership is incompetent (5%).

FEELINGS OF PERSONAL SAFETY







Albuquerque residents were asked, in their neighborhood, how safe they feel being outside at night and during the day by themselves.


Over four-fifths of City residents (82%) say that they feel either *very safe* (45%) or *somewhat safe* (37%) being outside **at night** in their neighborhood by themselves while 14% say they either feel *somewhat unsafe* (9%) or *very unsafe* (5%)


Residents living in the NE Heights are more apt to feel *very safe* in their neighborhood at night (56%), whereas those living in the North Valley/Downtown area are least apt to feel *very safe* at night (29%). It should also be noted that men (54%) are much more likely than women (37%) to feel *very safe* alone in their neighborhood at night.


Over nine-in-ten (94%) residents say they feel either *very safe* (75%) or *somewhat safe* (19%) being outside **during the day** by themselves in their neighborhoods; few residents say they feel unsafe (3%).

When residents are asked **how safe they feel in Downtown Albuquerque**, 45% say they feel either *very safe* (11%) or *somewhat safe* (34%). Fifteen percent say they feel *neither safe nor unsafe* and over one-quarter (28%) say they feel either *somewhat* (17%) or *very unsafe* (11%). Residents who are more likely than others to feel unsafe in Downtown Albuquerque include females (31%) and residents of the Far Northeast Heights (33%) region.

FEELINGS OF PERSONAL SAFETY: TRACKING RESULTS







Residents are more likely to say they feel *very safe* being alone in their neighborhood at night than they were three years ago (45% in 2014 compared to 39% in 2011).

The percentage of residents who say they feel safe alone outside during the day has not changed significantly since 2011. Residents are now only slightly less likely to feel safe in Downtown Albuquerque when compared to three years ago (50% in 2011 compared to 45% currently).

Residents were asked to rate how strongly they either agree or disagree with various statements regarding programs and services provided by the City of Albuquerque.

ALBUQUERQUE FIRE DEPARTMENT:

As shown on the preceding page, 85% of residents at least somewhat agree (a score of 4 or 5) AFD is **doing a good job responding to emergency medical service needs and making quick responses to medical emergencies**, with 55% who *strongly* agree. In comparison, 45% *strongly agreed* in the 2011 study.

Eighty-five percent of residents also agree that the Albuquerque Fire Department is **doing a good job addressing public safety issues and making quick responses to fires for the community** which is an improvement over the 75% who agreed in 2011. Residents are much more apt to *strongly agree* AFD is doing a good job addressing public safety issues and making quick fire responses than was observed three years ago (54% and 41%, respectively).

ADEQUACY OF RECREATIONAL AND COMMUNITY AMENITIES

Over six-in-ten (63%) residents agree **Albuquerque has adequate recreational opportunities for families, individuals, and community groups**, though 21% have neutral or mixed feelings (a score of 3) and 14% disagree.

ALBUQUERQUE POLICE DEPARTMENT

When it comes to the Albuquerque Police Department, just over two-fifths (42%) of residents believe APD is **doing a good job addressing public safety issues and making quick responses to emergencies**; however, these results show a fourteen percentage point decrease since the 2011 study (42% in 2014 compared to 56% in 2011). Further, three-in-ten residents currently disagree that APD is doing a good job addressing public safety issues and making quick responses to emergencies, marking a twelve percentage point *increase* since the 2011 study.

When residents were asked how strongly they agree or disagree that **APD** is respectful in its treatment to citizens, two-fifths of residents say they at least somewhat agree (a score of four or five) with this statement, marking a ten percentage-point decrease since the 2011 study. Further, over one-third (36%) of City residents currently disagree; a thirteen percentage-point increase since the 2011 study.

Demographically, residents under the age of 35 and those with a household income less than \$20,000 are more likely than others to disagree that APD is doing a good job addressing public safety issues or being respectful to citizens.


CITY STREETS AND RESPONSIVENESS OF GOVERNMENT

Similar to the 2011 study, over two-fifths (44%) of City residents agree that the **City street system is well maintained,** though 21% disagree and 34% have a neutral/mixed opinion.

Over one-third (36%) of residents at least somewhat agree (scores of four or five) that the **Albuquerque City government is responsive to community needs** while nearly one-quarter (23%) disagree.

When comparing the 2014 study results to the 2011 results, there is a slight increase in the percentage of City residents who agree with this statement and a slight decrease in the percentage who disagree. Further, seniors (46%) and those living in the North Valley/Downtown (48%) region are more likely than others to agree that that Albuquerque City government is responsive to community needs.

Over three-fifths (62%) of City residents agree that Albuquerque has adequate community amenities such as performing arts facilities and sports complexes, though 23% have mixed/neutral feelings and 13% disagree.


DON'T KNOW/WON'T SAY

Women (67%) are more likely than men (56%) to feel the City has adequate community amenities for things such as performing arts and sports.

In addition to rating their level of agreement regarding adequacy of recreational and community amenities, City residents were asked what types of recreational, cultural, performing arts, or sports related attractions or amenities they feel are needed in Albuquerque.

Fifteen-percent of residents say more activities for youth and teens and 13% mention either professional sports teams or performing arts centers. Six percent of residents mention either parks for recreational use, sports arena or sports complex, or sports fields for recreational use. Notably, one-third (32%) of residents did not offer a suggestion and another 8% feel as though Albuquerque has enough recreational activities.



Residents were asked how willing they would be to pay up to one-hundred dollars more in taxes or increased fees in order to expand and improve the cultural, performing arts, sports and recreational amenities available to Albuquerque residents.

Almost identical to the 2011 study results, one-fifth of residents say they would be *very willing* to pay more in taxes and fees to expand amenities while nearly two-fifths (38%) say they would be *somewhat willing* to do so. Over one-third (35%) of residents say they would be either *somewhat* (16%) or *very unwilling* (19%) to pay more in taxes to fund City amenities.

Residents between the ages of 35 and 49 (32%) are much more likely than seniors (8%) to be *very willing* to pay more to expand or improve City amenities. And, as would be expected, residents with higher levels of household income are more willing than those in lower income brackets to be willing to pay up to \$100 a year for improved amenities in the City.






Just over half (51%) of City residents say they have been to a City of Albuquerque or Bernalillo County public library or accessed the library's online services in the past year compared to the 57% who say they had visited a library in 2011. Residents most likely to say they have visited an Albuquerque or Bernalillo County public library include:

- Anglos (57%) compared to Hispanics (48%);
- Residents ages 35-49 (63%) compared to seniors (40%);
- Residents with household incomes of \$100,000 or more (65%);
- Residents with at least a four year college degree (60%); and
- Residents with a child under the age of eighteen in the household (61%).

Among those who have used library services in the past year, three-quarters say they were checking out a book and another quarter (26%) say they accessed the Internet. Other frequently mentioned services include: database research (12%), general research (12%), checking out DVD, movie or music (8%), and for computer usage (8%).





Similar to the 2011 study, residents express high levels of **satisfaction with the library services** that are available. As shown above on the left, nearly one-third (30%) of City residents rate library services as *excellent*, and half rate services as *good*. Of the total sample, only 1% of residents rate library services poorly.

As seen on the right, 94% of residents who say they have been to a City of Albuquerque or Bernalillo County library in the past year give either a *good* (53%) or *excellent* (41%) rating for the overall quality of services.

Residents were read a list of local government services and programs provided by the City of Albuquerque and asked to rate, on a five-point scale where a score of five means a *very high priority* and a score of one means *very low priority*, how much of a priority each service should be when Albuquerque officials plan for the City's budget.

The vast majority (83%) of residents believe that **improving community services**, including programs for homeless individuals and families, programs for substance abuse, and programs for individuals with mental health issues should be a high priority (a score of four or five) when planning for the City's budget, with 61% saying this should be a *very high* priority. In fact, only 4% of residents believe this should be a low priority.

Demographically, females (91%) compared to males (74%), residents with household incomes less than \$20,000 (80%) compared to residents with incomes over \$100,000 (38%), and residents with some college or less (66%) compared to residents who are at least college graduates (53%) are more apt to say improving community services should be a high priority.

Approximately four-fifths (81%) of residents say that **improving public safety services** should be a high priority (54% say it should be a *very high* priority), while only 3% feel this should be a low priority when planning the City's budget. Notably, Hispanics (60%), those with a high school education or less (63%), and residents of the UNM/Southeast (67%) region are more likely than others to say this service should be a *very high* priority.

Approximately two-thirds (68%) of City residents say that **partnering with businesses and local colleges in economic development programs** should be a high priority when planning the City budget, while 21% have a neutral opinion and 8% say this should be a low priority.

Nearly three-quarters (74%) of residents believe that **improving roads and streets** should be a high priority when planning the City budget, while one-fifth (21%) have a neutral opinion and only 6% say this should be a low priority. Importantly, residents of the Far Northeast Heights (81%) and North Valley/Downtown (80%) regions are more likely than residents of the Mid-Heights (66%), Westside/Southwest Mesa (73%), and UNM/Southeast (73%) regions to say that improving roads and streets should be a high priority.

Approximately three-fifths of City residents say that **improving parks and recreation programs** (62%) and **improving public transportation services** (59%), including Rapid Ride Transit Bus services should be high priorities when planning the City Budget.

When it comes to improving **parks and recreation**, Hispanics (35%) compared to Anglos (21%) and residents of the North Valley/Downtown (38%) and Westside/Southwest Mesa (33%) regions are more likely than others to say this should be a *very high priority*.


Similarly, Hispanics (40%) compared to Anglos (23%) and residents of the North Valley/Downtown (57%) region are more likely than others to say **improving public transportation** should be a *very high priority*.

After residents rated each service and program based on their perceived level of importance when planning the City budget, **residents were reminded of the** programs and services they gave the highest marks to and asked which one they believe should be the single <u>highest priority</u> for City officials.

Nearly half (48%) of City residents believe improving community services should be the single highest priority for City officials, while nearly one-fifth (18%) say the highest priority should be improving public safety. Approximately one-in-ten residents mention either partnering with businesses and local colleges in economic development programs (12%) or improve roads and streets (9%). Seven percent of residents say the highest priority should be improving public transportation and 4% say improve parks and recreational programs.


Residents most apt to feel improving community services should be the City's highest priority include residents with lower levels of income, females, and residents of the North Valley/Downtown region. Conversely, males and residents with higher levels of household income are more likely than others to mention improving public safety and partnering with business and local colleges in economic development programs.



Residents were asked whether they believe relations between people of different cultures and racial backgrounds in Albuquerque are excellent, good, fair, or poor.


Similar to previous studies, the majority of City residents believe relations between different cultures and racial backgrounds are either excellent (13%) or good (48%), while just over one-quarter (27%) say relations are fair. One-in-ten residents rate relations as poor.

Demographically, there are no significant differences observed between Anglo and Hispanic residents when it comes to relations between the different groups in Albuquerque. Further, over the past eleven years, there has been little change in residents' perception of race and culture relations.



Similar to the 2011 study, the vast majority of residents say they are either *very likely* (65%) or *likely* (20%) to **remain living in the City of Albuquerque five years from now**. Approximately one-in-ten residents say they are either *unlikely* (6%) or *very unlikely* (6%) to remain living in Albuquerque five years from now.

Seniors (85%) and Hispanics (71%) are more likely than others to say they are *very likely* to remain living in Albuquerque five years from now. While approximately half (52%) of residents under the age of 35 say they are *very likely* to be living in Albuquerque five years from now and another 29% are *likely* to stay, 17% say they are unlikely to be living in the City in five years.




